How Gift Card Scams Work

Gift card scams start with a call, text, email, or social media message. Scammers will say almost anything to get you to buy gift cards — like Google Play, Apple, or Amazon cards — and hand over the card number and PIN codes.

Here are some common tactics scammers use in gift card scams: **Scammers will say it's urgent.** They will say to pay them right away or something terrible will happen. They don't want you to have time to think about what they're saying or talk to someone you trust. Slow down. Don't pay. It's a scam. **Scammers will tell you which gift card to buy (and where)**. They might say to put money on an eBay, Google Play, Target, or Apple gift card. They

might send you to a specific store — often Walmart, Target, CVS, or Walgreens. Sometimes they'll tell you to buy cards at several stores, so cashiers won't get suspicious. The scammer also might stay on the phone with you while you go to the store and load money onto the card. If this happens to you, hang up. It's a scam Scammers will ask you for the gift card number and PIN. The card number and PIN on the back of the card let the scammer get the money you loaded onto the card — even if you still have the card itself. Slow down. Don't give them those numbers or send them a photo of the card. It's a scam.

Buying and Using Gift Cards

Gift cards are for gifts. Only gifts. Not for payments. Stick to stores you know and trust.

Inspect the gift card before you buy it.

Always keep a copy of the gift card and store receipt. Report fraud.
